The students at Turner Middle School just couldn't sit around and see the devastation Hurricane Katrina caused without reaching out.


. When they heard on the news about some teens raising funds and sponsoring schools in the stricken area, they asked, "Why don't we do that here, too?"






When they approached Assistant Principal Bill Siebers, not only did he give them the go-ahead, he jumped to enthusiastically support their project, which launched September 16th.
