🕇 here are many ways you and your sweetheart can spend Valentine's Day in Fort Collins. See the city from a hot-air balloon, spend some time at Swetsville Zoo and shop till you drop in Old Town. Romantic dining options abound in the city.


If you can clear your calendar, you and your Valentine will feel fortunate to be in Fort Collins on Tuesday, Feb. 14.

At dawn, sweep your Valentine off his or her feet with a hot-air balloon flight over Fort Collins from 💔 Windtracker Balloon Adventures LLC. Yes, there is champagne, and no, it isn't as cold up there as you might think.

Now that you are back on the ground, stop by the 👽 Egg & I at Lemay and Harmony to recount the thrill of your morning flight over a hearty breakfast. Then head east on Harmony, and just past I-25, pull into 💔 Swetsville Zoo. The child in each of you will enjoy matching the inventive titles to more than a hundred fanciful creations and scrap-metal dinosaurs displayed in amusing groupings all along the river.

On your way back to town, stop by the Fort Collins Convention and Visitors Bureau and collect brochures for future excursions to other places you live near but may never have visited.

When Prospect reaches College, turn south and pull into <a>Whole Foods on the west side of the road. The prepared

Now head downtown, stopping just long enough to check into the historic Armstrong Hotel. If you reserved a special romance package, you will find rose petals scattered in your room.

Stroll through Old Town and visit the increasingly famous VNew Belgium Brewing Company. Take a tour at 1, 2 or 3 p.m., meet the energetic crew and sample microbrews only available in the tasting room. Last year New Belgium invited customers to bring their dogs for

thing for you and your Valentine. Take a spin on the ice-skating rink in Old Town Square for some good, old-fashioned fun.

Kick off your shoes, unload your purchases and relax back at the Armstrong. Wallow in the indulgence of a fourcourse dinner served in your room with sparkling wine.


Make the short trip to the 💖 Lincoln

Weekend in Estes Park

The weekend before Valentine's Day, celebrate in Northern Col-👢 orado's most renowned playground: Estes Park. Create memories in a familiar day-trip haunt, a romantic bed and breakfast and Rocky Mountain National Park.

Stash your luggage in the car Thursday night so you are ready to head out as soon as you've finished work Friday.

Friday, Feb. 10

If you can make it into town by 7 p.m., "Colorado's Legendary Lovers," a free visual presentation at the VEstes Park Museum, will put you in a romantic mood. Author Rosemary Fetter shares excerpts from her book of "Historic Scandals, Heartthrobs and Haunting Romances" among famous Colorado lovebirds and talks about the history of Valentine's Day.


After the presentation, check in at the secluded Romantic RiverSong Bed and Breakfast Inn. Enjoy a candlelit dinner for two by the fire as part of the Stars in Your Eyes romance package. Then retire to your room and relax next to your private fireplace after a soak in the jetted tub. Be sure to schedule your "massage for two." Get to sleep early, as you have a full day ahead of you.

Saturday, Feb. 11

After a hearty breakfast at River-Song, put on your hiking clothes and explore the outdoors on RiverSong Trail. After your hike, pack up your luggage and check out.

Head to the Art Center of Estes Park, where you will don craft aprons and create hand-painted tiles expressing "What Colorado Means to You" as part of the Community Unity Project. The finished mosaic will beautify a pedestrian tunnel in town, and students from Eagle Rock School and Estes Park High are key players in the project. Today's tile-making runs from 10:30 to noon. Cost is \$8 per tile, and advance registration is required.

Ready for lunch? Head downtown to 💔 Mama Rose's for an authentic Italian meal or 💔 Poppy's Pizza and Grill for a heart-shaped pizza pie. Be sure to



meet Rob Pieper at Poppy's or Julie Pieper at Mama Rose's; the couple shares a special Valentine story of their own.


After lunch, explore the distinct shops and art galleries downtown. Then head southwest on Highway 36 to Hyde Chapel, on the grounds of the YMCA of the Rockies, where the 13th annual Student Solo and Ensemble Recitals will fill the hills — and your hearts — with music starting at 3 p.m. Admission is free, and a reception follows each hour of music. It's Family Valentine's Weekend at the YMCA, and themed family activities are planned. The center sports a game room, mini golf, skating and tennis. Check out the Maude Jellison Library and the Lula W. Dorsey Museum as well.

When you've had your fill of fun, head back to town and check in to the historic 💗 Stanley Hotel. Learn all about the lodge made famous by the film adaptation of Stephen King's novel "The Shining." Take advantage of Valentine's deals at the spa and dine at Cascades Restaurant. Enjoy some wine after dinner, and, as part of the Stanley's Classic Romance Package, have champagne and truffles delivered to your room.

If you're not yet ready to retire, head to the VEstes Park Brewery and Pub to sample the local microbrew selection.

Sunday, Feb. 12

Sleep in and then return to Cascades for breakfast. If you signed up for one of the Stanley's adventure getaways,



breakfast is included, and the hotel will provide you with a to-go lunch to take to Rocky Mountain National Park.

If you'd rather go it alone, Estes Park Visitors Center offers options as well as the latest reports of snowpack and weather conditions in the park. Plan a morning adventure exploring on cross country skis or snowshoes, hiking, horseback-riding or sledding.

After your morning recreation, head to Bond Park in the

center of downtown (see map's shaded area) for the Estes Park Dog Weight Pull, starting at 10:30 a.m. There are plenty of restaurants to choose from downtown for lunch, and you could visit some of the stores and galleries you missed Saturday — possibly returning for that item your sweetheart was eyeing.

For an outdoor experience that allows you to sit back and relax, call Aspen Lodge Ranch Resort and make your reservation for a romantic horsedrawn wagon or snuggly sleigh ride.



After lunch, loosen up and have some fun on the ice. The new Greeley


Ice Haus has plans for Valentine's Day specials. Call for more information and public skating hours.


